## LEAR

A sentence is a group of words that makes complete sense.

A sentence has to begin with a capital letter and have a verb.

It can end with a full stop (.), a question mark (?) or an exclamation mark (!).

Did you notice the words in blue? Even though they might not be words that we use in complete sentences, they convey what someone wants to express.

Words like ah, eww, aww, ouch, ugh, oops, etc. are called interjections. Interjections are words that help us express different emotions like happiness, sadness, anger, hurt, love, excitement, surprise, etc.

- Hurrah! Our team won.
- Shh! Be quiet during the speech.
- Woah! That shark is huge.

We always use an exclamation mark (!) after an interjection.
