

Nouns: Countable and Uncountable

The words child, pencil and flower pot can be counted. Nouns that can be counted are called countable nouns. Countable nouns can be singular or plural. For example: child-children, pencil-pencils, flower pot-flower pots.

The words bread, water and butter cannot be counted. Nouns that cannot be counted are called uncountable nouns. Uncountable nouns are usually treated as singular nouns.

REMEMBER -

- We use words like a few and many with countable nouns.
- We use words like a little, a lot of and much with uncountable nouns.
